Angel «l'ange protecteur» at Zurich Main Station



Since 1997, Niki de Saint Phalle's 11-meter-tall, vibrantly colored guardian angel has been suspended in the station concourse. With its bright colors and playful shapes, the angel is one of the artist's signature "Nana" figures. It symbolizes protection, joy of life, and energy—and thus watches over the thousands of travelers who pass through daily. At the same time, it serves as a popular meeting spot for many in the midst of the bustling station.

Turn around and look for the sign pointing to platforms 41–44. In the same direction, you'll find three escalators that take you down to the lower level.

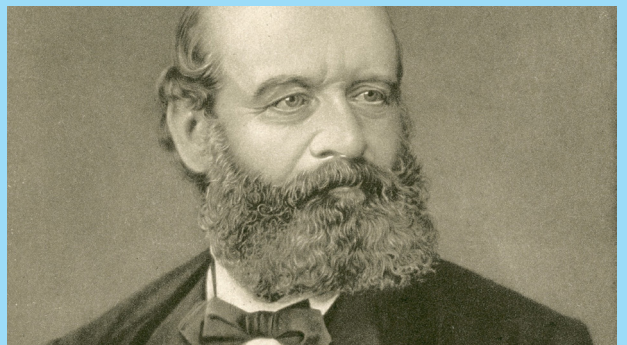
Information

Zurich Main Station



Zurich Main Station is the largest railway station in Switzerland and a major transportation hub, handling over 2,900 trains and 360,000 passengers daily. From here, you can reach Hamburg, Paris, Vienna, Milan, Amsterdam, and many other European cities within a few hours without having to change trains. However, the main station is not just a transportation hub, but also a lively meeting place for commuters and travelers from all over the world.

Alfred Escher



Alfred Escher was an influential politician and economic pioneer of the 19th century. As a member of the National Council and an entrepreneur, he played a decisive role in shaping the young federal state. He promoted the expansion of the railway network, founded the Swiss Credit Institution to finance major projects, and was the driving force behind the construction of the Gotthard Tunnel, strengthening Switzerland's connection to Europe. He died in Zurich in 1882 and is regarded as a central figure in the development of Switzerland's economy and transportation infrastructure.

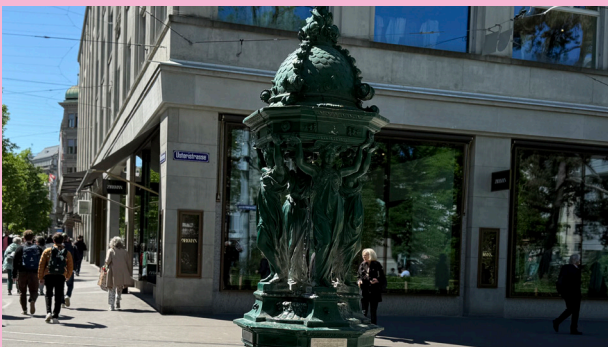
Confiserie Bachmann on Bahnhofstrasse

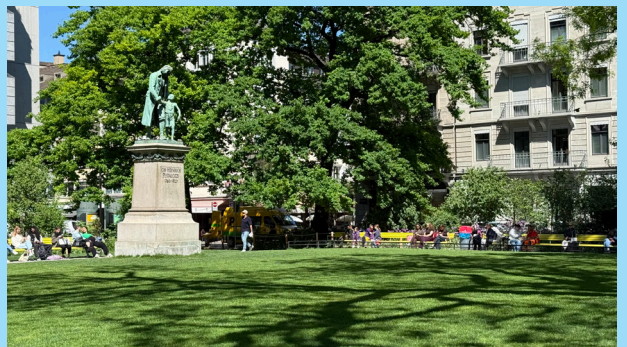

Urania Observatory



To your left, behind the building, is the Urania Observatory, which opened in 1907. It was Zurich's first concrete structure and has been a listed building since 1989. In the 50-meter-tall tower, visitors can observe the stars through a telescope with up to 600x magnification. Here, you'll definitely feel like you're a little closer to the sky.

Information

Rennweg



Rennweg is one of Zurich's most historic streets, connecting Bahnhofstrasse with the city's charming Old Town. Its central location, lively surroundings, and historic atmosphere make Rennweg a popular gathering place for locals and visitors from around the world. Lined with stylish shops and impressive buildings, the area invites you to relax, explore, and linger right in the heart of Zurich.

Hedwig ab Burghalden



In 1292, Hedwig ab Burghalden led a group of armed Zurich women to save the city from Duke Albrecht. After the Zurich troops had been defeated at Winterthur, Albrecht laid siege to Zurich. In this time of crisis, the women secretly armed themselves in the armory, marched to the Lindenhof under Hedwig's leadership, and took up battle positions. The unexpected sight of this force terrified Albrecht's army, causing it to flee and thus saving Zurich.

Lindenhof



The Lindenhof is a peaceful spot with a view in the heart of Zurich's Old Town. In 1798, the oath to the Helvetic Constitution was sworn here. Today, the Lindenhof is an oasis of peace and relaxation in the midst of the bustling city. Avid chess players, locals, and tourists alike enjoy gathering here.

Zurich Oldtown



Zurich's Old Town is a fascinating, historic district that tells stories spanning centuries. It consists of the Niederdorf and the Oberdorf, which still retain their medieval charm today. Münzplatz



Münzplatz is a small but historically significant square in the heart of Zurich. Located in the Old Town, it is surrounded by charming, old buildings. The square owes its name to the former mint that was located here in the Middle Ages. Today, Münzplatz is a quiet spot that is often overlooked by passers-by, yet it plays an important role in the city's history.

Augustinergasse



Augustinergasse is one of Zurich's most beautiful historic streets. With its well-preserved, colorfully decorated bay windows, it offers a fascinating glimpse into the city's past. The bay windows served not only to let light into the rooms but also as peepholes. They were never built directly above the entrances but were always slightly offset, so that uninvited guests could be spotted early on and skillfully avoided.

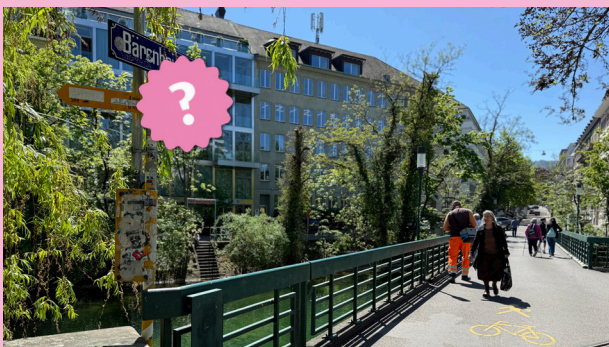

Bahnhofstrasse



Bahnhofstrasse is one of the most famous shopping streets in the world. Stretching 1.4 kilometers from the main train station to Lake Zurich, it is lined with exclusive department stores, boutiques, and jewelry stores. Internationally, it ranks among the ten most expensive shopping streets and boasts some of the highest sales per square meter in the world—only New York City and Hong Kong achieve similar figures.

Schanzengraben



The Schanzengraben is a historic canal that winds its way through the Zurich cityscape. It was constructed in the 17th century as part of the fortifications surrounding the Old Town and played an important role in the defense of Zurich. Today, the Schanzengraben is best known for its picturesque surroundings. Lined with trees, the canal forms a green oasis in the heart of the city, inviting visitors to take a stroll and relax.

Bachmann on Bleicherweg



Bleicherweg went pink in 2023! Following the success of its locations in Sihlcity and on Bahnhofstrasse, Confiserie Bachmann has opened its third specialty shop in Zurich here. Zurich tram network



The Zurich tram network comprises more than 15 lines and carries over 202.6 million passengers annually. It is the backbone of public transportation and connects the city center with outlying neighborhoods. VBZ operates modern, environmentally friendly vehicles that are known for their punctuality. Since its electrification in the 19th century, the network has continued to evolve—an impressive example of how tradition and innovation come together in Zurich.

Paradeplatz



Paradeplatz forms the vibrant heart of Bahnhofstrasse and serves as a major tram hub. Known in the 17th century as the "Säumärt" (Pig Market) because livestock was regularly traded there, the square experienced an economic boom in the early 19th century and was initially named "Neumarkt." Fifty years later, it received its current name. Since the major Swiss banks established their headquarters here, Paradeplatz has established itself as Switzerland's most important financial hub.

Cross Paradeplatz and look for "Züghusplatz." Turn onto Waaggasse there, and you'll come to the next large square: Münsterhof.

Münsterhof



Münsterhof is the beating heart of Zurich's Old Town. Surrounded by historic buildings and located near major churches such as the Grossmünster and Fraumünster, it reflects the city's rich history. The square is a popular meeting place for locals and tourists alike—whether for street festivals, markets, or a leisurely stroll. Here, a medieval backdrop meets modern city life, creating a unique atmosphere that invites you to linger.

Fraumünster Church



The Fraumünster is one of Zurich's oldest and most famous churches. Founded in the 9th century, it impresses not only with its history but also with its architecture and works of art. Particularly famous are the colorful stained-glass windows designed by Marc Chagall and Augusto Giacometti. The Fraumünster was originally a Benedictine convent. Today, the church is a popular destination for visitors who come to enjoy the impressive art and the peaceful atmosphere.

Grossmünster Church



The Grossmünster is one of Zurich's most famous landmarks and an important symbol of the city. The church was built in the 12th century in the Romanesque style and is closely associated with the Zurich Reformation and Ulrich Zwingli. The architecture of the Grossmünster is particularly impressive, with its striking towers and historic crypt. The church also offers a spectacular view of the city and Lake Zurich. City Hall



Zurich City Hall has been the political center of the Canton of Zurich since the 17th century. To this day, the Cantonal Council and the City Council meet here, where important decisions for the city and the canton are made. Located directly on the Limmat River, this historic building, with its impressive architecture, defines the heart of Zurich's Old Town. Particularly striking are the two lions on the façade: they symbolize strength, protection, and peace and have stood for the values and history of the city of Zurich for centuries.

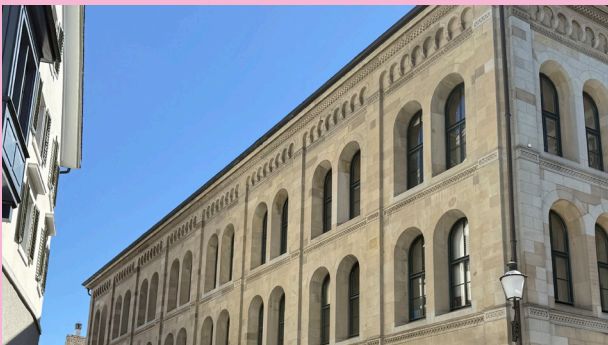

Niederdörfli

Zwingli Square

Information

Ulrich Zwingli



Ulrich Zwingli was a leading theologian of the Swiss Reformation. Born in 1484, he became a parish priest in Zurich in 1519, where he advocated a return to the Bible as the sole source of faith. Zwingli implemented reforms such as the translation of the Bible into German and the prohibition of the veneration of images. In 1531, he fell in the Battle of Kappel, where he fought against the Catholic cantons. He remains a central figure of the Swiss Reformation. This monument to Zwingli was unveiled on August 15, 1885.

Frauenbadi (Women's swimming area)



Until 1837, public bathing was prohibited for women. After the ban was lifted, the city opened a "bathhouse for women" that same year. This facility was originally intended only for personal hygiene and not for swimming, as many homes in Zurich still lacked running water at the time. In 1888, the bathhouse was rebuilt in the Art Nouveau style and took on its current form. Today, the Frauenbad is still a place exclusively for women to bathe and relax. Since 1997, there has also been an evening bar service, to which men are also admitted.

Kronenhalle



The Kronenhalle is a Zurich legend. Since its opening in 1924, it has attracted guests from all over the world. Here, they not only enjoy classic dishes but also revel in a unique art collection. Works by Picasso, Chagall, and other masters hang on the walls—Picasso himself was a famous guest at the Kronenhalle. The Swiss writer Friedrich Dürrenmatt was also a nearly daily visitor who made the Kronenhalle his regular haunt.

Lake Zurich & Quaibrücke



Lake Zurich is the natural heart of the city and a popular recreational area. Stretching 40 kilometers, it offers numerous recreational activities such as boat trips, swimming, and walks along the shore. The Quaibrücke was built in 1864 and connects the city center with eastern Zurich. More than 50,000 vehicles and 1,530 trams cross the bridge every day. However, the Quaibrücke is not only an important transportation hub but also offers a spectacular view of the lake and the mountains.

Information

Sechseläutenplatz



Sechseläutenplatz is a central square in Zurich, known for the traditional Sechseläuten festival, which is celebrated every spring. The highlight of the festival is the burning of the Böögg—a large snowman figure filled with fireworks. This custom dates back to the 16th century and symbolizes the farewell to winter. The faster the Böögg burns and its head explodes, the more beautiful and warmer the summer is said to be. Sechseläutenplatz serves as the backdrop for this special tradition, which attracts thousands of visitors every year.

Zurich Opera House



The Zurich Opera House is one of Europe's most important opera houses and a cultural landmark of the city. It was inaugurated in 1891 and impresses with its magnificent façade and elegant auditorium. Each year, around 250,000 visitors enjoy world-class opera, ballet, and concerts here. It is home to the internationally renowned opera and ballet companies. The picturesque Sechseläutenplatz in front of the building invites visitors to linger, making the opera house a central meeting place for art and culture lovers.

Uetliberg



On a clear day, you can see the Uetliberg on the opposite shore of Lake Zurich. The Uetliberg is Zurich's local mountain and a popular destination for day trips. At about 870 meters above sea level, it offers breathtaking views of the city, Lake Zurich, and the Alps. A well-developed network of hiking trails and mountain bike routes winds through the recreational area. The Uetlibergbahn takes visitors comfortably almost to the summit. Whether by day or night—the Uetliberg is an impressive destination for nature lovers and city dwellers alike.

Zurich Stadelhofen Station



The Zurich Stadelhofen train station is one of the city's busiest stations. Every day, around 83,000 passengers pass through the facility designed by Santiago Calatrava, with its striking steel structures. With three tracks and numerous shops, the station is a major transportation hub. Approximately 150,000 train movements take place here annually. Thanks to its central location, it connects the city with the Gold Coast and the Lake Zurich region—serving as both an architectural landmark and a vibrant meeting place.

Haus zum Falken



The Haus zum Falken at Zurich Stadelhofen Station is a new architectural highlight by Santiago Calatrava. Replacing the original building, a modern structure with a striking façade is being constructed that blends harmoniously into the cityscape. Inside, it offers space for offices and shops, while an underground bicycle station with approximately 800 parking spaces improves mobility in Zurich. The building was completed in 2025.
